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
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# Welcome HOBY Ambassador, the future is yours!

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
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In Memoriam

# Panel 1 "How the Media Shape the Electoral Process"



#### Richard Alarcon

Richard Alarcon was elected to the California State Senate in 1998, where he currently serves as Senate Majority Whip. Prior to his election to the Senate, he served for five years on the Los Angeles City Council. Alarcon believes in involving the community and building consensus in finding solutions to problems. Whether it's fighting for more police officers, creating new jobs or adding streetlights, Alarcon has become a champion for the San FernandoValley. Sen. Alarcon is chair of the Senate Housing and Community Development Committee and the Subcommittee on Environmental

Justice. He also serves on the Senate Energy, Utilities and Communications, Education, Environmental Quality, and Industrial Relations Committees.

#### Michelle DeArmond

The Associated Press political reporter Michelle DeArmond got a close-up view of politics early in life and has been interested in it ever since. She attended the University of Missouri-Columbia's journalism school, interned with the "Lawrence Journal World" in Kansas, and later was a Pulliam Fellow at the "Indianapolis Star" while working for The Associated Press. The wire service transferred her to Las Vegas, where she covered the Tailhook trial, among other national stories, and she served as the poll writer for the state in the 1996 elections. She moved to Los Angeles and



began covering California politics in 1997. She covered both the gubernatorial and Senate races in 1998, Indian gaming issues in the 1998 and 2000 elections, and other ballot initiatives and political issues.



#### Kenneth Reich

Kenneth Reich is consumer affairs columnist for the Los Angeles Times. He began his journalism career at United Press International's Sacramento bureau in 1962. After a brief stint at Life magazine, he joined the Times in 1965 as a general assignment writer. As a political reporter, he covered the presidential campaigns of Eugene McCarthy (1968), George Wallace (1972) and Jimmy Carter (1976). Among his other assignments, was the paper's lead Olympics writer from 1977 to 1982, and he covered

the finances and politics of the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games from 1982 to 1985. He received his bachelor's degree in government from Dartmouth University, spending his junior year at the Institut D'Etudes Politique in Paris. His master's degree in political science is from the University of California, Berkeley.

#### **Daniel Stern**

Daniel Stern is known by moviegoers all over the world for his roles in "Home Alone," City Slickers," Breaking Away," and "Diner." He is an active advocate for youth, serving in a national campaign teach media literacy. He is the honorary membership chair for the California State PTA for the year 2000. He has been a longtime sponsor of Teaching Tolerance, the Southern Poverty Law Center's nationwide effort to nurture tolerance and celebrate diversity in grades K-12. He is the proud father of three children Henry, 18 (HOBY California-Central alum, 1998), Sophie, 15, and Ella, 11. He has been happily married to his wife Laure for longer than either can remember.



# Panel 2 "The California Education Climate"

#### Marqueece Harris-Dawson

Marqueece Harris-Dawson is the director of Youth Programs for the Community Coalition in South Los Angeles, a non-profit organization committed to building a powerful voice for residents, students, and workers. He helps empower students from South Central Los Angeles' eight high schools to identify community problems and take action. Through the organization's efforts, students have photographed and exposed poor conditions at local schools and mobilized more than 6,000 fellow students to secure \$153 million in funding to improve school infrastructure, fix lockers and improve student bathrooms.

#### Jane Sweetland Edwards

An English and journalism teacher at Rio Mesa High School in Oxnard, Jane Sweetland Edwards in 1996 was the first recipient of the Ventura County Ed Lyons Award for excellence in teaching. And in 1997 she was one of 20 teachers in California to receive the Johns Hopkins Award for Excellence in Gifted Education. Teaching is not her first career, however. For seven years after earning her degree from the University of California, she was a media and marketing manager in San Francisco, New York, and Vancouver. She also worked for television, magazines, and radio.



#### Barbara Thorpe

Barbara Thorpe, Ed.D., is associate academic vice president of California State University, Channel Islands, the 23rd and newest campus in the CSU system. She chaired the largest distance undergraduate nursing program in the western United States, serving 2,500 students. She holds a master's degree in nursing from CSU, a master's degree in public health from the University of Tennessee and a doctorate in education from the University of San Francisco. She has conducted research around community needs assessment, planning and design of integrated K-12 health and

community centers in under-served communities.

#### Lois Tinson

Lois Tinson, past president of the California Teachers Association, teaches reading and English at North Park High School in Baldwin Park. When she was elected CTA president in 1995, she was the first ethnic minority to hold the position. She also served on the California State Commission on Teacher Credentialing and as the National Education Association's representative to the Educational Testing Service. She is listed in Who's Who in Black America and Who's Who Among International Women. She received her bachelor's degree from the University of Arkansas, and her master's and doctorate degrees in institutional management from Pepperdine University, where she also is an instructor of grad school education.

#### **Wesley Hyre**

For the last year, Wesley Hyre has worked with AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps, a 10-month residential program helping address the needs of underserved communities. During this stint, he did trail work in Monterey County, helped restore buildings in San Diego, built trails, bridges, and overlooks for the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, educated elementary school students on conflict resolution and worked at a Boys and Girls Club in Alaska. He is currently with VISTA (Volunteers in Service To America).

#### Kim Alaine Rathman, Ph.D.

Kim Alaine Rathman, Ph.D., is associate director of development for Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership's international headquarters. Prior to this position, she was the director of development for the Charter School of Education at California State University, Los Angeles. She received an honors diploma in international law and policy from the University of Vienna, Austria, a master's degree in divinity from Union Theological Seminary in New York, and a doctorate in ethics and social policy from the cooperative program between the Graduate Theological Union and the



University of California, Berkeley. She has been a volunteer, community organizer, strategic planner and fund raiser for several non-profit, anti-poverty organizations in Los Angeles, Berkeley, Oakland, San Francisco, New York, and Haiti.

#### Michael Biswas

Michael Biswas is director of Inside Sales and Member Relations for BigVine.com, an online exchange for businesses that use the barter process to help them grow. Previously, he was with TeleTech Telecommunications, which specializes in inbound telephone call center management. #### Mike Gin

Redondo Beach City Councilmember Mike Gin is project leader for the production support staff at Infonet Services Corporation in El Segundo. Among his political posts, he has served on the Redondo Beach Planning Commission, the Redondo Beach Preservation Commission, the Los Angeles County Sanitation District and the South Bay Council of Governments. He was honored in 1993 as "Young Man of the Year" by the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce. He is active in numerous civic organizations, including the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce, the Redondo Beach Jaycees, the

Chinese Americans United for Self Empowerment (CAUSE), and the Chinese Heart Council. He received his bachelor's degree in computer science from the University of Southern California.

#### Julia Justus McGinity

Julia Justus McGinity of Berkhemer/Clayton, Inc, served as a chief advisor on the senior staff of former California Gov. Pete Wilson, where she identified, screened, and evaluated candidates for the governor's executive and senior management appointments for the State of California. He was selected in 1994 by Time magazine as "one of America's most promising leaders of the future." Similar accolades have come from Black Enterprise magazine ("25 future leaders to watch"), Swing magazine

("one of the 30 most powerful twentysomethings in America"), the Los Angeles Business Journal ("distinguished 40 under 40"), and Town and Country magazine ("the new breed of philanthropic leaders").

#### Tim Leets

Tim Leets is owner of Leets International, an Internet marketing business with operations throughout the United States and around the world. He also is a director and chief operating officer for InterNet Associates and INA books. Previously, he was a certified public accountant and business consultant. He has coached many individuals to greater levels of success, and he conducts numerous seminars on "Playing to Win in Business and in Life." He received his bachelor's degree (magna cum laude) from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. He has been married to his wife Lisa for 16 years and they have two daughters, Whitney, 7, and Tori, 3.

In 1958, actor Hugh O'Brian was privileged to spend nine days in Africa with Dr. Albert Schweitzer, whose remarks and observations were both profound and stimulating. In reference to youth and education, Schweitzer told O'Brian: "The most important thing in education is to teach young people to think for themselves."

Dr. Schweitzer's words deeply moved O'Brian to explore the avenues through which he might influence the lives of our young people. Gradually, a concept evolved, and the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation (HOBY) was born.

The HOBY program is simple: Bring a select group of high school sophomores with demonstrated leadership qualities

#### Selection Process

Nomination materials are sent in September of each year to the 22,000 public and private high schools in the United States. All sophomores are eligible to attend one of the three- to four-day seminars held in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Bahamas, Canada and Mexico. An outstanding sophomore leader is nominated by each school and is certified by its principal.

#### **Results of HOBY Seminars**

The effectiveness of HOBY seminars is noted in the results of HOBY's most recent evaluation:

- 80 percent of ambassadors noted they had a better understanding of the free enterprise, economic and American political systems.
- 98 percent said they know what steps to take to be a better leader.

together with a group of distinguished leaders in business, industry, education, government and the professions, and let the two interact. Using a seminar question-and-answer format, the young people get a realistic look at the workings of the American incentive system, which broadens their perspective and better enables them to think for themselves.

High school sophomores are chosen as the focal point for the HOBY program not only because their age is critical in focusing on future goals and forming opinions for adulthood, but also because they have the opportunity to create a "ripple effect" from their HOBY experience in their remaining high school years.least 30 countries to attend this international seminar.

These expense-paid workshops focus on the theme "America's Incentive System," and encourage the young leaders toward responsible citizenship of community volunteerism and service. One young man or woman is selected to represent his or her site at a week-long World Leadership Congress held in late summer. In addition, HOBY invites young leaders from at least 30 countries to attend this international seminar.

- 98 percent said they know volunteering is important.
- 99 percent said HOBY encourages them to think independently.
- The evaluation found that HOBY encourages Ambassadors to set goals and that the responsibility for personal growth and leadership development is placed squarely on them.

To seek out, recognize and reward leadership potential in high school sophomores from throughout California, the United States and abroad.


To encourage and assist members of this formative age group in their quest for self-identification and self-development.
