

#### Panel 1: Media

"Media Gone Wild! Who Should Be Responsible for Content?"



#### **Dana Drake**

I realized that I wanted to be a television journalist in 7th grade. I was born and raised in the Los Angeles area and went to college in San Diego. After college, I followed my dream to Oxnard in Ventura County where I worked as an Assignment Manager for a UPN station, doing on-camera reporting on the side. I got my first on-air reporting job in New Mexico at a small NBC bureau in the Four Corners. I was a one-woman band -- I was the videographer, editor, reporter and anchor. My work was rewarded when I won national recognition by my peers (Geller Fellowship Award) and a job in a larger market after one year in New Mexico. I moved on to

the NBC affiliate in Boise and the CBS affiliate in Las Vegas, where I continued to win awards (2001 Associated Press Reporter of the Year). However, after eight years and much thought I decided it was time for a change. The television news business was changing, and not in ways I supported. (I can discuss this). I also wanted to take my career to the next level and return home to Los Angeles. I now produce 2-hour documentary biographies for E! Entertainment Networks.


#### Ron Olsen

Ron Olsen believes one of the most important elements in our society is freedom of the press, and he is an outspoken advocate for press freedoms. He has been a reporter, anchor and talk show host at KTLA-TV in Los Angeles, where he has covered many of the biggest stories of the last 17 years. He is currently working with the Los Angeles Times, adapting newspaper stories for television. He began his career on the college radio station at the University of Minnesota, then he moved to TV at KTSP in Minneapolis. He is a two-time Emmy Award winner, and a seven-time nominee. He also received a Peabody Award. He has appeared on such shows as "This Week with David Brinkley" on ABC, and "Reliable Sources" on CNN as an expert on the media. He even was featured on an Italian television network during the O.J. Simpson criminal trial.

"Scores, Volunteering, Grades? What Matters for College?"



#### Dr. Greg Sawyer

Dr. Wm. Gregory Sawyer was appointed California State University Channel Islands founding Vice President for Student Affairs in January 2002. He came to Southern California from Florida Gulf Coast University where he served as the Founding Dean of Students and Communication faculty. Prior to his appointment at FGCU, Dr. Sawyer served in the Dean of Students office at the University of North Texas from 1985-1995. While at the University of North Texas, Dr. Sawyer was promoted from Assistant Dean to Associate Dean to Dean of Students in a period of five years. Dr. Sawyer was also a member of the UNT Communication faculty (adjunct)

for over 10 years. Dr. Sawyer earned his B.A. in Communication and English from Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio, his M.A. in Organizational Communication Behavior from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, New Mexico and his PhD in Higher Education Administration from the University of North Texas. He completed his post-doctoral studies at Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Throughout his tenure as an educator and administrator, Dr. Sawyer has been recognized seven times by students as "Top Professor."

#### Laura M. Vaughan

Laura M. Vaughan is the assistant director and coordinator of transfer admission at California Lutheran University. Born in Clovis, California, she graduated from Cal Lutheran University, cum laude, in 2000 with a bachelor of science degree in psychology. In 2002, Laura graduated from the University of San Diego with a master of arts degree in counseling. Laura oversees transfer strategy in the Admission office and created the transfer admission manual currently used by that office.

#### Paul Brown

Paul Brown graduated from Santa Ynez Valley Union High School in 1986 and Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo in 1992 with a degree in agriculture education. Throughout the course of his life, Paul has had the opportunity to be the lead singer in a band, a military policeman, a drill instructor for at-risk youth, a national level rugby player, a loving husband to his wonderful wife Jayne, and he began and still operates a decade-old business that won the 1998 Governor's Award for Small Business. Paul ran for San Luis Obispo City Council in 2002, missing by only 11 votes, and recently announced his intention to be on the ballot again this November.

#### **Richard Cochrane**

Educated at Ohio University and a U.S. Navy veteran, Richard W. Cochrane worked with a leading advertising, public relations and fund raising firm that served major accounts, including U.S. Steel, General Electric, Harvard University and scores of others. His political experience has now included more than 300 campaigns at every level with an 80% winning record. His first campaign and win was his father's township trustee campaign in eastern Ohio at age 9. He and his younger brother traveled the township with their Flexible Flyer wagon leafleted with hand-drawn "Vote for Our Dad – We Would If We Could" flyers. His father won. He has been directly involved in the planning and direction of non-profit and political campaigns totaling more than \$1 billion. An Ace Award winner, Richard is a prolific and creative writer, having edited a collegiate magazine, a medical research journal, hundreds of brochures and letters and produced more than 5,000 radio and television commercials.

#### John Duran

Mayor John J. Duran was elected to the West Hollywood City Council on March 6, 2001. His election was the continuation of a long and dedicated history of service to the West Hollywood community. From 2000 to 2001 he served as vice-chair of the West Hollywood Rent Stabilization Commission, adjudicating appeals for landlord/tenant disputes and making policy recommendations on affordable housing and protection of tenants' rights. Since 1996, Mayor Duran has served as a volunteer attorney for the Coalition for Economic Survival (CES) Legal Clinic, where he continues to represent tenants—many of them West Hollywood residents—on



issues including unlawful detainers, wrongful conviction and discrimination. Mayor Duran, a native Angelino, received his law degree from Western State University in Orange County and leads one of Southern California's prominent law firms on gay and lesbian rights and AIDS law.

Projected revenue for 2004 exceeds 4.5 million dollars. David is a graduate of Don Bosco Technical High School and Pepperdine University, where he earned an associate's degree in graphic communications and a bachelor's degree from the Graziado School of Business and Management, respectfully.

Anne Henderson currently serves as Vice President of Customer Delivery and Support Services for Digital Insight, a leading e-finance enabler. With 13 years of financial services experience, she has worked with organizations around the world to leverage technology to achieve improved financial results and customer satisfaction. Before joining Digital Insight in 2000, Anne's consulting background included Practice Director positions at Oracle Corporation and Treasury Services Corporation. While at Oracle and Treasury Services, she specialized in the management of large projects for top-tier domestic and international financial institutions.

In 1999, Bryan Sarlitt founded TechXpress, a company specializing in providing one-stop computer and website management services to small business and residential computer users. Through its sustained community involvement, niche oriented focus and strategic branding and marketing program, TechXpress aspires to one day take its business model to a national level.

James W. Whitaker, 24, is the owner of Left Coast Enterprises, Inc., a multi-faceted corporation with businesses in the e-commerce and clothing industries. James is a graduate of the Orfalea College of Business at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, where he also earned minors in economics and philosophy. James started Left Coast Enterprises at the age of 19 with his brother David while both were still in school. James grew up in Pleasant Hill, California, and now lives in San Luis Obispo.

#### Panel 5: Volunteerism

"Volunteer Superstars: Projects That Matter"



#### **Brandon Keefe**

When Brandon Keefe was eight, he decided to create a library at Hollygrove, a residential treatment center for abused children in Hollywood. His idea was simple: 70 kids at Hollygrove needed books to help them learn to read and Brandon knew that he and his fellow students had great books at home that they no longer read. Brandon organized a book drive with his fellow students to recycle their books for Hollygrove. Over the next three years, Brandon continued his annual book drives and the library began to grow. The community heard about the red-haired boy's dream of a Hollygrove library and

organizations stepped in to build bookshelves, people volunteered their time, librarians bar-coded the books to create a true lending library and mentors were trained to sit down with the children and teach them to read. Today, Brandon is 18 and a freshman at UCLA. He serves as spokesperson on the board of directors of BookEnds, the nonprofit organization that he co-founded. Using Brandon's model, more than 110,000 students have learned the joys of community service through organizing BookEnds' book drives. 125 libraries have been developed in needy schools and youth organizations through the donation of more than 450,000 books, giving more than 70,000 kids the tools they need to learn to read.

#### Niko and Theo Milonopoulos

The City of Los Angeles' proposed legislation to ban the sale of gun ammunition citywide was the idea of twin brothers Niko and Theo Milonopoulos, then 15. The pair, 10th graders at Campbell Hall High School in North Hollywood, are co-founders of Kidz-Voice-LA, a non-profit organization run by kids for kids, which lobbies for gun control legislation and other issues that impact kids' lives. Children lobbying





for gun control laws at the local level, on behalf of other children and themselves, is a unique and successful approach in addressing one of America's most contentious

issues. Nick and Theo's work has touched the lives of thousands through television coverage of their events and during interviews and appearances on CBS, CNN, "The Roseanne Show" and PBS. Their oped pieces published in the Los Angeles Times and the Los Angeles Daily News – as well as articles written about their work in Parade, Child and React magazines – have been read by people throughout the nation.

#### **Brittany Roach**

Brittany Roach has been a Girl Scout since first grade. As she moved up the Girl Scout ranks through the last eight years, Brittany has earned two high honors. In May of 2001, Brittany received the Silver Award, the highest honor given to Cadette Girl Scouts, for collecting 3,000 pounds of humanitarian aid and donating it to three Polish orphanages and one hospital. Two years later, Brittany earned the Gold Award, the highest honor given to a Senior Girl Scout, for collecting over 1,400 children's books and creating a permanent library at Upward Bound House, a transitional housing facility in Santa Monica. Brittany, who is now a freshman at



University High School, reflects on the years her of community service. In her own words, "Volunteering has provided me with opportunities to increase my self-esteem, self-worth, and global awareness. I do these charitable projects for self-respect - not for glory and praise of others." Brittany continues to shine through her leadership skills. She is the student founder and president of the University High School Springs Club; a 9th grade class officer; and a Key Club International member.

# Guest Speaker



#### Chris McCarty

A 13-year HOBY volunteer, Chris McCarty is the organization's president and chief executive officer. Before coming to HOBY, McCarty served as regional director of communications for Ohio-based health care provider Humility of Mary Health Partners. He founded and operated two advertising agencies, providing support to consumer and industrial customers. As a HOBY volunteer, he was named "Volunteer of the Year" in 2002 – singled out from more than 4,000 for this honor. He is a former president of the Kiwanis Club of Girard (Ohio) and an officer of the Kiwanis Club of Youngstown (Ohio). Chris has also served as board member of

the Northern Ohio American Heart Association for over six years. He has recently relocated to Los Angeles, home of HOBY's international offices.



#### **HOBY Background**

In 1958, actor Hugh O'Brian was privileged to spend nine days in Africa with Dr. Albert Schweitzer, whose remarks and observations were both profound and stimulating. In reference to youth and education, Schweitzer told O'Brian: "The most important thing in education is to teach young people to think for themselves."

Dr. Schweitzer's words deeply moved O'Brian to explore the avenues through which he might influence the lives of young people. Gradually, a concept evolved, and Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership (HOBY) was born.

The HOBY program is simple: Bring a select group of high school sophomores with demonstrated leadership qualities together with a group of distinguished leaders. in business, industry, education, government and the professions, and let the two interact. Using a seminar question-and-answer format, the young people get a realistic look at the workings of the American incentive system, which broadens their perspective and better enables them to think for themselves.

High school sophomores are chosen as the focal point for the HOBY program not only because their age is critical in focusing on future goals and forming opinions for adulthood, but also because they have the opportunity to create a "ripple effect" from their HOBY experience in their remaining high school years.

#### **Selection Process**

Nomination materials are sent in September of each year to the 22,000 public and private high schools in the United States. All sophomores are eligible to attend one of the three to four-day seminars held in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Bahamas, Canada and Mexico. An outstanding sophomore leader is nominated by each school and is certified by its principal.

These workshops focus on the theme "America's Incentive System," and encourage the young leaders toward responsible citizenship of community volunteerism and service. One young man or woman is selected to represent his or her site at a week-long World Leadership Congress held in late summer. HOBY invites young leaders from at least 30 countries to attend this international seminar.

#### **Results of HOBY Seminars**

The effectiveness of HOBY seminars is noted in the results of HOBY's most recent evaluation:

- 80 percent of ambassadors noted they had a better understanding of the free enterprise, economic and
   American political systems.
- 98 percent said they know what steps to take to be a better leader.
- 98 percent said they know volunteering is important.
- 99 percent said HOBY encourages them to think independently.
- The evaluation found that HOBY encourages Ambassadors to set goals and that the responsibility for personal growth and leadership development is placed squarely on them.

To encourage and assist members of this formative age group in their quest for self-identification and self-development.

To stimulate opportunities for these young people to demonstrate their leadership abilities when they return home for betterment of community and country.


